

# Gardiner Scholarship

2017-2018 End of Year Report




# **Report Summary**

- In 2017-2018, there were 10,258 students participating in the Gardiner Scholarship program. Of these students, 9,627 students received their scholarship through Step Up For Students.
- Sixty-three percent of students were diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder.
- More Gardiner students lived in Miami-Dade County than in any other county (13.3%) followed by Orange county (7.9%).
- Most students were enrolled in elementary grades Kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade (43.1%).
- The average Gardiner scholarship award was \$10,276, compared to \$10,144 in 2016-17.
- On average, Gardiner students submitted 17 reimbursements and spent 76% of his/her award.
- In terms of student purchases, instructional materials category experienced more growth than any other category, increasing from 38% of students in 2016-2017 to 42% of students in 2017-2018 spending a portion of their award in this category.
- Only 7.3% of students did not use any of their scholarship during the year, compared to 7.6% in 2016-2017.
- Almost 59 percent of students used a portion of their funds for enrollment tuition and fees.
- Twenty percent of students used their scholarship for specialized services, like speech therapy.
- A smaller proportion of money was spent on tutoring this year than in previous years.
- More families used their scholarship for a variety of different educational expenses than last year.

# Introduction

The Gardiner Scholarship program is a Florida School Choice program designed to help parents individualize educational options for their children with specific special needs. The program has served students for 4 complete school years and is currently administered by two state-approved, non-profit scholarship funding organizations (SFO), Step Up For Students and AAA Scholarship Foundation. This report provides summary



information for students participating in the Gardiner Scholarship program through Step Up For Students (SUFS) during 2017-2018 school year. For the purpose of this report, only expenditures with a service date between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2018 and payment date prior to August 30, 2018 were included.

## **Program Eligibility Requirements**

Gardiner Scholarship eligibility is based on residency, age, and disability. To be eligible to receive the scholarship for the 2017-2018 year, a student must have been:

- A Florida resident
- Eligible to enroll from 3 yrs. old through 12th grade or 22 yrs. old, whichever comes first.
- The subject of an Individual Education Plan (IEP) written in accordance with rules of the State Board of Education or has received a disability diagnosis as defined from a physician who is licensed under Florida Statutes chapter 458 or chapter 459, or a psychologist who is licensed in Florida
- Diagnosed with one of the following disabilities: Autism spectrum disorder, Muscular dystrophy, Cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, Phelan McDermid syndrome, Prader-Willi syndrome, Spina bifida, Williams syndrome, Intellectual disability (severe cognitive impairment), rare diseases as defined by the National Organization for Rare Disorders, anaphylaxis, deaf, visually impaired, dual sensory impaired, traumatic brain injured, hospital or homebound as defined by the rules of the State Board of Education and evidenced by reports from local school districts, or 3-5 year-olds who are deemed high-risk due to developmental delays and not older than 5 on Sept. 1 may be eligible for the year they apply.

• The date that eligibility is confirmed influences the scholarship amount awarded. A full (100%) scholarship will be given to those who qualify by September 1st, while 75% will be given if eligibility is confirmed by November 1st. For those who qualify later in the school year, 50% of the scholarship will be given to those whose eligibility is confirmed by February 1st, and 25% will be given for those who qualify by April 1st.

#### **Student Enrollment**

In 2017-2018, there were 9,627 students who participated in the Gardiner Scholarship program through Step Up For Students, compared to 7,589 students in the 2016-2017 school year. Students ranged from 3 years old to 12th grade and comprised several different races, grade levels, prior


school types, and disabilities. Students were likewise found to be primarily enrolled in private school, while approximately 30% of Gardiner students were home schooled. 1

### **School Enrollment**

There were 1,634 approved private schools participating in the Gardiner Scholarship program in 2017-18. Of these schools, 65% received payments for tuition or other educational services for 5,630 students.

# **Scholarship Awards**

The average scholarship awarded for 2017-2018 was \$10,276.00. However, the actual amount of a child's award is based on his/her grade, county of residence, and the date eligibility is confirmed. For Step Up for Students, a total of \$98,940,425.54 was awarded to 9,627 students. As of June 30, 2018, SUFS families spent \$73,656,317 on qualifying educational expenses. On average, SUFS families submitted an average 17 reimbursements per child and spent \$7,651.02 of each child's scholarship award. Unspent funds in student accounts roll over from year to year and are refunded to the state if the student has not enrolled in any eligible



post-secondary institution for three consecutive years following high school graduation.

# Findings Regarding Scholarship Expenditures

- Nearly 75% of scholarship funds awarded in 2017-18 were expended by June 30, 2018.
- Sixty-five percent of funds were spent on enrollment tuition and fees.






<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>Private and home school rates are based on students who were at least 6 years old by February 1, 2018, which is the mandatory age for school attendance. These rates are approximate and based on information obtained from Gardiner families and from private school payments. Thirtyone students were not assigned a current school type due to a lack of information.

- expenditures in the top spending categories remained virtually unchanged from the 2016-17 school year; however, there were differences in the proportion of students who spent funds in each category.
- Forty-two percent of students who used their Gardiner scholarship spent a portion of their award on instructional materials, up from 38 percent of students in 2016-17.
- Families who spent money on tutoring spent an average of \$3,672 on tutoring services during the year.
- Non-spending has decreased steadily since the beginning of the program. In 2017-18, there were 701 students (7.2 percent) who had not used their scholarship award by the end of the fiscal year. Over half of non-spenders were new students and approximately 40 percent were ages 3 through 5.







