## Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program

## September 2014 Quarterly Report

The Florida Tax Credit (FTC) Scholarship Program was established in 2001 to encourage private, voluntary contributions from corporate donors to non-profit scholarship funding organizations (SFOs) that award scholarships to children from low-income families. Two Scholarship Funding Organizations (SFOs) have been approved to participate for the 2014-15 school year. A corporation can receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit up to $100 \%$ of its state income tax liability. The program also includes credits against the insurance premium tax for contributions to eligible non-profit SFOs, credits against severance taxes on oil and gas production, self-accrued sales tax liabilities of direct pay permit holders, and alcoholic beverage taxes on beer, wine, and spirits. The maximum amount the state may award is $\$ 357.8$ million in credits for the 2014-15 fiscal year. This program expands educational opportunities and school choice for children of families that have limited financial resources.
